



John Charles Charbonneau

September 9, 1937 - September 14, 2024

Joseph John Charles Omer Charbonneau, was born on September 9, 1937, in Rolla, North Dakota, to Romeo and Frances Charbonneau. John was a devoted son and a cherished big brother to Raymond. When the boys were young, the family moved to Seattle, Washington, where John developed a love for the outdoors and became a proud Boy Scout. His Scout sash, adorned with numerous merit badges, remains a treasured keepsake for his family, a testament to his dedication and passion for learning, which he instilled in his own sons, who also became Scouts.

From a young age, John worked in fruit orchards and vegetable fields to help support his family. He excelled in school, balancing academics with caring for his younger brother. Both boys shared a deep love for football, a passion that followed them into high school and adult life. John insisted that Raymond attend college and John chose to serve his country.

In June 1955, just three months shy of his 18th birthday, John enlisted in the United States Army. His service took him across the globe, with numerous tours in Korea, and Europe, and three tours in Vietnam. Among these, his first tour with the 82nd Airborne and his time as a MAC-V Advisor to a Montagnard unit in the highlands of Vietnam were particularly significant. "Duty, Honor, Country, Family" became his personal code. After nearly 30 years of service, John retired in 1984.

John's awards include National Defense Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal (2 Oak Leaf Clusters), NCO Professional Development Ribbon, Army

Service Ribbon, Meritorious Service Medal, 9 Service Stripes, Overseas Service Bars (3rd Award), Overseas Service Ribbon (4th Award) and Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross, and Unit Citation Cross of Gallantry with Palm.

John married Helga Zimprich while stationed in Germany in 1957, and together they welcomed four children: Terry, Ken, Sylvia, and Evelyn. In 1977, he married B.J. Palmer, with whom he shared the joy of raising their daughter, Jamie.

A true lover of life, John was actively involved in Muskogee Grace Episcopal Church and embraced varied hobbies. He was an avid rockhound, skilled marksman, enthusiastic kayaker, and passionate traveler. His love for nature extended to camping and hiking, and he was always eager to share his knowledge of geology as the President of the Rock and Mineral Society. He delighted in teaching students about rocks, gems, and minerals during school science classes. An avid reader of action novels and a fan of country music, John cheered passionately for his favorite teams, including the Saints and Oklahoma State University Cowboys.

John was not only a beloved son, brother, uncle, husband, father, and grandfather but also a guiding light to those whose lives he touched. He passed peacefully on September 14, 2024, at the age of 87, surrounded by the love and prayers of his wife, children, grandchildren, extended family and friends. His legacy of Duty, Honor, Country, and love of Family comforts the hearts of all who loved and miss him.

A memorial service for John will be at 1:30PM, Thursday, October 17, 2024 at Fort Gibson National Cemetery with military honors being presented.

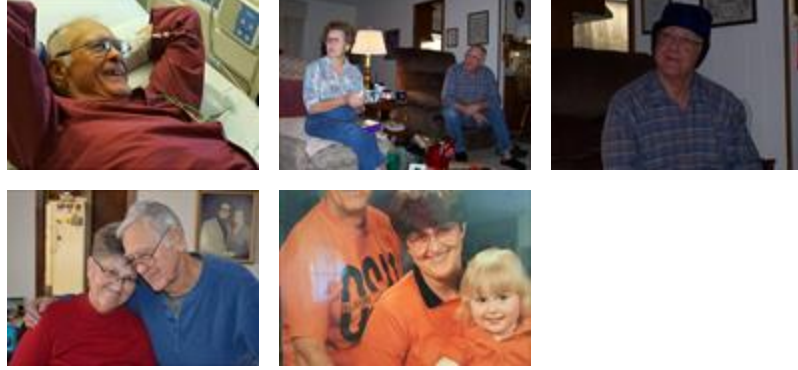
You taught me how to love working with my hands.
