



Ruth Ann Arndt

January 5, 1934 - August 21, 2014

Ruth Ann Rodgers Arndt was born January 5, 1934 in Lincoln, Nebraska to Clifford A. and Gladys M. (Robinson) Rodgers. Her early years were spent in Nebraska and Kansas but most of her public schooling came in Muskogee, Ok. She attended A. R. Jr. High and graduated from old Central High School in 1951. After graduation she attended Bethany Nazarene College, Muskogee Junior College and eventually gained her B. S. and Masters of Education from Northeastern State University. She was a member of Phi Theta Kappa.

On June 14, 1952 she married Darrell R. Arndt in Muskogee, OK and that marriage dissolved. After that she completed her education and she began her teaching career in Eufaula, OK. She then moved to Muskogee Public Schools and was one of the first teachers to begin the integration process teaching at old Sadler Jr. High School. She would later teach at West High Jr. High School and McCoy's returning to West High until retirement.

She loved teaching and loved her students and tried to make her classes enjoyable and challenging. A high point of each year was the Science Fair and one of her most rewarding experiences was accompanying one of her students who qualified for the International Science Fair held in San Diego, CA.

After retiring from teaching she kept an active lifestyle. She enjoyed being a

Flea Market vendor, gardening, building masonry projects, cutting and splitting her own firewood and being an active member of the volunteer services at Muskogee Regional, now Eastar medical center. By April, 2014 she had contributed over 4,500 volunteer hours, serving as vice-president and later president of that service. In everything she did she believed that if you were going to do something do it right and would give 150%.

She was an avid fan of OU football except when they played Nebraska when she returned to her roots and cheered for the red and white instead of the Crimson and Cream. Through the years she was steadfast in her faith in Jesus Christ and very active in church activities and choirs until her health began to fade.

She was preceded in death by her parents and both brothers; C. Bill Rodgers and Charles A. Rodgers.

She is survived by one son, Tom Arndt and wife Janell; a granddaughter Julia C. Arndt; a grandson David B. Arndt and wife Sarah. Great grandchildren Joshua, Rachel and Uriah Arndt. She is also survived by other relatives and many friends including two furry friends, Snoopy and Frisky.

Family visitation will be Monday, August 25, 2014 at Cornerstone Funeral Home, 1830 N. York St. Muskogee from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Funeral services celebrating Ruth's life will be 11:00 am, Tuesday, August 26, 2014 at New Life Center, 4025 Gibson St., Muskogee, OK with Pastor Philip Morris officiating. Interment will follow at Memorial Park Cemetery. “ To Ms. Arndt's family and friends:

Science was not my "thing". Didn't like it because I didn't really care about it. I didn't relate it to the things I was interested in, or how it was relevant to my limited view of life. Then came Mrs. Arndt. Patient. Calm. Committed. Knowledgeable. Lively ...and so funny! Her dry wit caught me off guard and also got me over such things as dissecting "critters". She made science relatable to my life and everyday things and she taught us how to look for the science behind everything. Suddenly I could see science when I was spelunking with my dad, or watching baby chicks hatch at grandpas, or looking at the X-rays of my broken toe with the doctor. Aha!

If she had class favorites, she didn't treat anyone differently. I suspect we each thought we were favored, you just wouldn't see it as one student being treated better or worse than another. She was exacting and expected our best efforts - she told us that on the first day. She was patient with us when she saw we were trying but not "getting it". If you didn't try, she kept looking for a way to make it interesting or relatable for you. She would ask about your hobbies and interests and use those as examples. I truly think she believed in each of us.

What a wonderful, wonderful teacher you shared with us, a bunch of rowdy ninth graders doing a new thing. It was our first foray into being the big kids, but we were also the first class to participate in the joining of Sadler to the de-segregation efforts in Muskogee and there were some tense times. Some of us had gone to "mixed" schools and some had not. So it wasn't easy to be a teacher with that age group and during a major social transition. I doubt that we appreciated that aspect of her gifts at the time. I am grateful to her and so happy to be able to see how what she gave us continues to grow. Never doubt that she remains; not only in those of you who share her DNA, but also in each of us that she taught.

Ruth Arndt '72" She wrote those words because we were the first class that was at Sadler that year and there were tensions due to de-segregation of our schools. She was a leader to prove that ALL students could achieve if we opened our minds to overcome adversity together as a community. A gift to all of her students.

I didn't ever forget her and went back to visit her until my family moved away in 1976. Because of her teachings in my first exposure to Life Science, I developed a love for learning all things in Science. I made great grades in college in my BiSci and Earth Science classes because her. I went on two trips with my kids to Costa Rica on school Science trips where we planted trees to reforest the rain forest in that part of Central America and told the kids that they will never forget Mrs. Elkins, the teacher leading the trip. It was there that I told my kids and their fellow students about Mrs. Arndt and her love of Science and how she instilled in us to search in knowledge of all things.

I was blessed to know her and to have her as a teacher. My sincere sympathy to all who mourn her loss and prayers for God's peace and grace as you celebrate a life whose life touched so many.
